In 1967 we bought our home and were among the very youngest in the neighborhood and now, well, the fact that we are in this article says it all. We celebrated our 60th wedding anniversary this past August. We wanted a home in Richardson Heights because it had a fireplace, but we ended up buying here because it was less expensive than the south side of Beltline. Things have changed since then. We paid \$18,750 and had a monthly mortgage payment of \$109. Yes, things have changed a lot. The trees were much smaller then, the neighborhood was filled with kids and the yards filled with kids and parent's visiting. Someone started the "HP Babysitting Club". You had to be invited to join. Once you did, the moms would meet socially and pass out coupons that granted you babysitting hours. It was very successful. Heights Park with its space themed playground was a favorite stomping ground for our two boys. Heights Shopping Center featured a Kroger's (now TJMaxx), a Dad and Ladds Mens shop, Friends Bookstore and Margies Florist. Fred's passion is gardening. We're proud of the fact that we have won Yard of the Month a couple of times. We've done extensive remodeling to the home in all these years but we still have our beautiful original hardwood floors. Some things haven't changed-Heights Park has a great central location, and it is a place of peace with a strong sense of community.

It's true, this has been our home for 62 years! My husband Dave and I both worked for Collins Radio when we married in 1961. We bought our home in 1962 for \$20,000 there were so many young couples from many other U.S. locations living on Weatherred, many with children. Collins Radio and Texas Instruments were quickly increasing the population of Richardson. Dave planted five onegallon red oaks. Those HUGE trees still grace our yard. Our neighbors like the idea and started doing the same. Now you know how the "neighborhood leaf exchange" started in our neighborhood! Dave also loved playing golf. He considered Heights Elementary school (right out our back gate) his private driving range and must have hit millions of balls from the batting cage on the north end to Beltline and back again. Dave passed in 1988 but I'm still here and still enjoying all this lovely area has to offer, especially those fall leaves!

We were married in 1965 at the First Baptist Church on the corner of Phillips and Greenville Ave. As we drove around in our '58 Chevrolet, we were drawn to this area. When we spotted this charming home we said, "That's where we want to live." and we've been here ever since. We won't leave until our maker brings us to our forever home. We paid a whopping \$12,000k for our house. Our two daughters, Debbie and Cathy, were raised here, both of whom attended Heights Elementary, West Jr. High and R.H.S. Judy's parents were Emory and Laverne Huffhines who lived at 105 North Gentle Drive. The Huffhines family were among the first settlers, true pioneers of Richardson in the mid 1800's. We were both life long teachers; Judy taught 3rd grade for 25 years in R.I.S.D. and I taught for D.I.S.D. We love the location of Heights Park. I could walk to church, even to Central to hitchhike into downtown if I wanted to! It's great having a park practically in our backyard and watching all the new folks that are now future settlers, making this their home just as we and many others have done.

My parents were the original owners of this home which they purchased in 1962. When I grew up here, Arapaho was a two lane road. We shopped at Piggly Wiggly on Arapaho in the shopping center where Taco Bell is located. My siblings and I would walk to go swimming at the pool on Arapaho and Floyd. There was no Rec Center and the pool was very basic, not at all like the one there now. Renner Road was just a bunch of empty fields of cotton. I still have my library card from the first library on Greenville Ave! I was in the third graduating class at Pearce High School, a much smaller school then without a pool nor even a library. Eventually I moved to the Northrich neighborhood but came back to Heights Park. People take good care of their properties and it's a perk having a park right in our area to walk in. Over the years, I've been involved in our community from being on the neighborhood association board to serving on the Yard of the Month committee. Since 2009, I've served as a Block Captain delivering the H.P.N.A. newsletters. It keeps me walking, connected to my neighbors, and helping out our neighborhood association.

My parents, Ed and Jackie Patton purchased this Ridgedale residence in 1955. I began my residency in 1956. My older siblings Patricia, Joe David and I attended Heights Elementary (where our Boy Scout Troop planted the trees between the circle drive and Floyd Road), West Jr. High and R.H.S. The Pattons attended Richardson Heights Baptist Church faithfully on the corner of Floyd and Beltline. The church bought houses beside it and used them for their youth Sunday school before they were removed and the new building constructed on Beltline. My father was the owner of Preston Road Plumbing Company. When I was a kid, I played baseball and football at Heights Park. The tall rocketship slide had to have extra iron added to keep the kids from jumping off the top level! I spent my summer's at the Gray's home on the corner of Westwood and Lindale, the only one with air conditioning! The Patton backyard usually had a football game going with the kids in the neighborhood. I left to attend college but was drawn back here because of my love of Heights Park. Kelly and I married in 1990. She feels the same connection here and unites back by being a Block Captain. She has given her time for the neighborhood association and neighbors for eight years.

When we bought our home in 1968 (paying under \$22k), we were drawn to it's floor plan and the screened in porch, but we also loved the trees. We added to them by planting several in our backyard that are still here. Few houses had fences and if they did, they were chain link, not wood. Our two boys and two girls would play in Cottonwood Creek, accessing it through a ravine that was off Thompson at the end of Ridgedale. A large white, two story wood home sat in front of a pond with not much around it where the hospital is now located on Campbell. At the corner of Spring Valley & Waterview stood a house with a barn, corral and horses. Richardson had no public kindergartens. I've always been active in giving back to my community. When door-to-door fundraising was allowed, such as the March of Dimes, I would do that. I've been a Block Captain since the position was created about 20 years ago and on Crime Watch patrol for 15 years. It feels good to contribute to your neighborhood.


